This 24-hour course is intended for law enforcement officers, investigators, technicians, and crime laboratory personnel tasked with processing crime scenes and/or physical evidence for latent print evidence. The course stresses hands-on practice with latent print development materials and methods; including conventional, fluorescent and magnetic powder processing, adhesive materials processing, basic chemical processing, and cyanoacrylate fuming. You will learn to collect and preserve latent print evidence using tape lifting techniques, photography, and impression casting materials. **PREREQUISITE:** None.
